MRS. OLE CHRISTOPHERSON

Centerville, S. D.—Mrs. Ole Christopherson, one of Centerville's oldest pioneer women, died Sunday after a lingering illness of many months.

Born in Denmark in September, 1858, she came to this country with her parents in 1861, and settled in Racine, Wis. One year later the family came to South Dakota in 1862, and settled a homestead in Westerville township, in Clay county. Twice married, Mrs. Christopherson

was widowed by her first husband, John Johnson, in 1885, who left her with four sons.

She married Ole Christopherson in 1887, and they have had a happy companionship of 53 years.

The couple have been residents of Centerville since 1914.

Surviving Mrs. Christopherson is Ole Christopherson, three Johnson boys, four Christopherson children, 22 grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

The town of Showlow, Ariz., is said to have been named for a ranch won in pioneer days during a game of seven-up.
